Which of us, when finding ourselves in the presence of a painting, has not sensed that we lack the keys to decipher it? We feel an emotional response, but the work still seems to evade our understanding. Francoise Barbe-Gall combines a nuanced understanding of the way viewers respond to paintings with a rich knowledge of their context and circumstances of their creation. The result is like a tour of a dazzlingly eclectic museum in the company of a gentle yet authoritative guide. She takes as her point of departure the impressions that we all feel when confronted by a canvas and takes us on a voyage of discovery fired by her own passionate enthusiasm for the subject. What is the painting's relationship with the real world? Has the artist idealized nature, or distorted it? Did they want to shock the viewer, or provide consolation? With a clear approach and straightforward yet subtle analysis, the meaning of each work slowly becomes clear. From Raphael's penetrating character study of Castiglione, through Hopper's cinematic take on the wee small hours of the morning Barbe-Gall begins by covering a number of ostensibly realistic works, made from the stuff of everyday life. Going in quite the other direction, she looks at the way paintings can express moments of heightened reality, from the perfection of Boticelli's Primavera to the arresting glance of Vermeer's girl with the Pearl Earring. She discusses paintings that distort the visible world (Parmigianino's Madonna with an improbably long neck to Dali's melting clocks) and those that sow confusion to make us more vigilant and pay closer attention to the real world (Cezanne's depiction of a forest glade, or a mysterious fifteenth century altarpiece). Questions of history, style, iconography and composition are not neglected and are dealt in context of the paintings she discusses.

With resources running low, and her physical strength severely compromised, May must rely on someone back home to help her. The problem is: everyone thinks she's dead. Back on Earth, it's been weeks since *Hawking II* has communicated with NASA, and Dr. Stephen Knox is on bereavement leave to deal with the apparent death of his estranged wife, whose decision to participate in the Europa mission strained their marriage past the point of no return. But when he gets word that NASA has received a transmission from May, Stephen comes rushing to her aid. What he doesn't know is that not everyone wants May to make it back alive. Even more terrifying: she might not be alone on that ship. Featuring a twisting and suspenseful plot and compelling characters, *Across the Void* is a moving and evocative thriller that you won't be able to put down.

Meditations on fatherhood from the author of *Jerusalem: Chronicles from the Holy City* With *A User's Guide to Neglectful Parenting*, the trademark dry humor that pervades Guy Delisle's landmark and praised graphic travelogues takes center stage. Quick, light vignettes play on the worries and cares any young parent might have, and offer wry solutions to the petty frustrations of being a dad who works from home. With a background in art history and history, she also translates books and exhibitions for museums in North America and Europe. She lives in Montreal.

Every so often a novel appears wholly unlike anything that has appeared before. *Across the Nightingale Floor* is such a novel. The first book in *The Otori Trilogy*, it is a brilliantly imagined, seductive tale of war and intrigue, the intensity of first love, and the tragedy of betrayal. Overcome by the intensity of first love and conflicted by split loyalties and his own divided nature, Takeo realises that he must make his own way on this journey of revenge and treachery, honour and loyalty, betrayal and love.

Die 40 jaar hebben titels gebaard die zich voorgoed in het geheugen van de filmliefhebber hebben genesteld. Fellini ontrafelt het universum van de filmmaker en boort de bronnen van zijn rijke verbeelding aan. Foto's, archiefstukken, brieven en affiches geven 20 jaar na zijn overlijden inzicht in de obsessies en drijfveren van de man achter *La strada*, *La dolce vita* en *8½*. Fellini verkent het leven en werk van legendarisch filmmaker aan de hand van vier thema's: *Popular Culture*, *Fellini at Work*, *The City of Women* en *Biographical Imagination*. Een diepgravende analyse nuanceert en verrijkt het beeld van het Fellini-universum als een wereld van overdadige vertellingen over extravagante personages. Een universum waarin Fellini's alter ego meerdere keren gespeeld door Marcello Mastroianni in steeds wisselende gedaantes opduikt en waarin een parade van groteske menselijke zwakheden de revue passeert. Deze analyse wordt verder aangevuld met korte teksten die dieper ingaan op de specifieke kenmerken van zijn oeuvre, zoals Fellini's werkwijze, obsessies en samenwerkingen. Zo krijgt de lezer een uniek inzicht in de inspiratiebronnen van Fellini: van het ruwe materiaal tot aan zijn creatieve proces en verder. Hiermee laat het boek zien hoe de filmmaker onlosmakelijk verbonden

is met de eeuw van de cinema en de eeuw van het beeld in het algemeen. Het boek bevat verder een weelde aan visueel materiaal, van filmstills tot fotosets, tekeningen, beelden uit home movies, stills uit Fellini's reclamefilms, strips, ongebruikte scènes, tijdschriften en affiches. My Traitor tells the story of Antoine, an idealistic young French violin-maker, who takes a train from Dublin to Belfast in 1977 and is propelled into the heart of the Falls Road and the Republican movement, and Ireland's music, suffering and beauty. He meets Tyrone Meehan, a charismatic, high-ranking member of the IRA, who becomes his friend and mentor, and a symbol of the Irish struggle. As he increasingly identifies with his newfound home, Antoine leaves behind his life in Paris. Over the next three decades, from the streets of Belfast to the fields of Donegal, he witnesses the marches, the hunger strikes, the peace process, learning about bombs, prison, poverty and pride. In 2005 his world implodes when the IRA finally lay down their arms and Tyrone is revealed as an informer. An intense depiction of the nature of friendship and loyalty, and the emptiness occasioned by betrayal, *My Traitor* is a powerful lyric novel - an ode to Northern Ireland - paying an outsider's tribute to a wounded and extraordinary country.
